

What is HP NewWave Mail?

NewWave Mail (version A.01.00) is the information distribution service of HP NewWave Office. NewWave Mail combines the intuitive, easy to use NewWave environment with powerful corporate-wide communications capabilities. Wherever NewWave users need to communicate with others on the corporate HP 3000 network, NewWave Mail provides a fully-integrated, transparent solution.

New and Current Wave Coexist

NewWave, HP DeskManager and AdvanceMail users can all exchange information with each other and they can read, print and, in many cases, edit the information whether they are using a terminal or a PC. This means that you can add NewWave users to your existing system and at the same time protect your investment in existing hardware and software.

Quick and Easy Connections

NewWave Mail connects users quickly and easily whatever connection method is being used. Where LANs are installed, access to the system is handled by the LAN. In situations where serial connections are being used, either with a direct connection or via modem or X.25, NewWave Mail has built-in datacommunication software to handle the most complex logon procedures.

If you are already using HP AdvanceLink or HP AdvanceMail, you can use the same connections as before. The networking software is the same and connection files are compatible. This makes NewWave Mail faster to install and more cost effective as no extra networking investment is required.

Connecting to the outside world

Many companies today use a combination of public and private information systems. NewWave users can connect to other systems using the capabilities available in HP DeskManager. These connections include IBM's PROFS and DISOSS, other external systems by means of X.400, telex via HP Telex (where available) and the worldwide fax network via HP OfficeFax.


HP NewWave Mail Features

As with Hewlett-Packard's previous mailing applications, NewWave Mail has the rich set of mailing functions you would expect from a leading supplier of information systems solutions. In addition to the ability to send and receive any object to any user, NewWave Mail provides automatic, background transfer of messages, full distribution list checking, forward and reply capabilities, priority mailing, new mail notification, automatic conversions and mail filters.

Sending Messages

Creating and sending messages in NewWave Mail is simple. Just dropping an object onto the Outtray creates a message. NewWave Mail prompts you for the names of recipients in TO: CC: and BCC: categories. It can validate the names immediately. Before mailing you can set priority or make a message private. Whether you send a message immediately or use the timed transfer capability, your message is sent in the background so you can continue with other tasks.

Receiving Messages

Messages arrive automatically in background in the In tray. From the Intray you can read, print, edit, file, reply to or forward messages or their contents, new mail notification keeps you informed of new messages arriving. Received items are automatically converted into the format of choice. Filters can route messages to the printer, the wastebasket or the In tray.

Online Help

Context Sensitive help is available on all topics as well as a comprehensive index.

Filing

You can file messages or objects from the In tray into folders in the NewWave file drawer.

Connections

NewWave Mail supports: RS 232 connections to the HP 3000 via ATP or DTC ports. NS/3000 and OfficeShare LAN networks.

Basic Serial Connection files enable you to create connections via: CCITT X.25 with an HP 2334 PAD HP 2334/5 Multiplexer Hayes compatible modems
